GENERAL TRAVEL INFORMATION



CURRENCY

1 Canadian dollar (CAD) = 100 cents



TIME DIFFERENCE

Multiple time zones

The difference ranges from CET -9h (West Coast) to CET -5h (East Coast)

Newfoundland Standard Time (NST) CET -4.5h (St. John)

Atlantic Standard Time (AST) CET -5h (Halifax)

Eastern Standard Time (EST) CET -6h (Toronto, Montreal)

Central Standard Time (CST) CET -7h (Winnipeg, Regina)

Mountain Standard Time (MST) CET -8h (Edmonton, Calgary)

Pacific Standard Time (PST) CET -9h (Vancouver)

Canadian Summer Time (standard time plus one hour) applies from

the second Sunday in March to the first Sunday in November.

Saskatchewan (Regina) is the only province in Canada that does not have daylight saving time.



CLIMATE

There are large differences because of the size of the country. There is a humid Pacific climate on the west coast, a dry continental climate in the Prairie Provinces and an Atlantic climate influenced by the Gulf Stream in the east. The temperate climate zone is relatively narrow, and the arctic climate extends into the inhabited areas. Average temperatures range from -20° C to $+25^{\circ}$ C, while extreme temperatures range from -40° C to $+40^{\circ}$ C. In the cold season, you need appropriate equipment.

HEALTH

European standard of health care. Doctor's fees are very high. As the nationalized health system is overstretched due to a lack of doctors, there are long waiting times for primary care. Apart from critical conditions, there are also extremely long waiting times for follow-up treatments. Travelers in Canada generally cannot visit general practitioners without an appointment as most accept only pre-registered patients.

Vaccinations

No vaccinations are required on entry, except when entering via an infected area (smallpox).



INSURANCE

You are strongly advised to take out travel insurance for illness and ambulance services (there are extremely high hospital costs as well as long waiting periods for treatment in Canada).

WALRUS HUNT

HUNTING LOCATION AND ACCOMMODATION







Walrus hunts are carried out with the use of motorized boast to transport you the hunting areas. When Walrus are spotted, they are stalked upon while resting on large ice floes or small rocky island haul outs. Shooting ranges are close in, usually under 35 meter (approx.. 40 yards). A brain shot or neck shot for an instant kill is recommended. The success rate to date has been 100 percent.

Accommodations are within the local community hotel and not included in the package price. This is a great time of year to be in the Arctic with spectacular photographic opportunities, 24 h daylight and a better than average chance of seeing a Polar Bear.

HUNT INFORMATION

Normally 5 days are scheduled for all hunts, hunt guidance 1:2 (1 boat, 1 hunter and 2 hunting guides). Hunt is over once a Walrus is harvested.

SPECIFIC INFORMATION: Every client who wants to take a Walrus cape for a shoulder mount or for a life sized taxidermy has to communicate this early enough, so that the hunting guides can be informed and make sure that the Inuit skinners remove all the grease from the skin.

Traveling on the sea and hunting Walrus by boat can be more dangerous than a normal hunt. Clients undertake this hunt on their own risk. Clients are requested by law to wear survival suits which are included. These suits are very warm and are worn instead of an anorak, but they also serve as a swimming aid and slow down hypothermia. You will obtain further details and information on site, where you receive these suits for the duration of the hunt.

Caping of the walrus head at a cost of CAD 500,— or complete skinning of the walrus for life-size mount at a cost of CAD 1,500,— paid directly to the guide.

Additionally, a penalty fee of USD 1,000,— will be charged should the hunt be moved to the following year.

LICENSE AND TAG:

The Government of Nunavut fees for a foreign non-resident harvest license, tag and species authorization surcharge are on request.

There are no other fees for a harvested walrus. Canada North will pre-arrange for the license to be waiting at the wildlife in the select Inuit community. Government fees are subject to change without notice.

TROPHY TRANSPORTATION AND REPRODUCTION

MARINE MAMMAL PROTECTION ACT: It is illegal to import walrus tusks or skins into the United Mexican States even when these items are exported under the authority of the CITES permit. It may be illegal to import walrus tusks to other countries as well. It is the responsibility of each hunter to check on laws governing Atlantic walrus importation of their respective home countries.

European clients must leave their Atlantic walrus trophy with a Canadian taxidermist who will prepare the necessary documents in obtaining a CITES export permit. For clients unable to bring Atlantic walrus tusks and capes home due to regulations such as the US Marine Mammal Protection Act, trophy replicas can be made by any one of our recommended taxidermists.

CARIBOU/MUSKOX HUNT



HUNTING LOCATION

The Qamanirjuaaq caribou herd numbers are approx. 400,000. Hunting with the use of an ATV or boat, a mobile guide and hunter can always find caribou. Hunters are carried out of the main camp with comfortable

accommodations, running water, and home cooked meals. Whenever caribou are located at long distances from the main camp facilities, then drop camps with more basic features will be used.

HUNT

INCIDENTAL SPECIES: Hunting an Arctic Wolf as an incidental species can be added to your package. If requested, it must be pre-arranged and pre-paid, however, if a wolf is NOT harvested, you will be refunded the full amount less your license, tag and species surcharge fees.

NOTE: Additionally, a penalty fee of USD 1,250,— will be charged should the hunt be moved to the following year.

MUSKOX HUNT



HUNTING LOCATION

The Barren Ground Muskox is found only on the continental mainland of Canada and inhabits the areas from the Arctic coast.

The hunt package consist of 5 full days, however, it ends immediately after a muskox is harvested. All hunts are

based on a 2:2 hunter to guide ratio traveling together on snowmobiles for safety measures. Accommodation during the hunt are heated basic plywood cabins that Inuit use as shelters while out on the land.

HUNT

INCIDENTAL SPECIES: Hunting an Arctic Wolf as an incidental species can be added to your package. If requested, it must be pre-arranged and pre-paid, however, if a wolf is NOT harvested, you will be refunded the full amount less your license, tag and species surcharge fees.

NOTE: Additionally, a penalty fee of USD 1,250,— will be charged should the hunt be moved to the following year.

GENERAL HUNTING INFORMATION

LICENSES AND TROPHY FEES

Canadians without permanent residence in Canada CAD 20 $^-$, foreigners without permanent residence in Canada CAD 50 $^-$. All fees are payable in cash in CAD or by traveler's check. The export requires a CITES permit.

For American hunters the American CITES Import Permit needs to be obtained at the conclusion of the hunt. Detailed information can be found in the final provisions. All licenses and trophy fees are governmental charges and may change without notice. All fees mentioned are excluding taxes.

PAYMENTS

A deposit of 50 % is payable upon booking. The final payment is due 60 days prior to travel start date. A refund

can be granted, if a substitute hunter is found.

CANCELLATION

We recommend taking out travel insurance. If the hunter cannot go on the hunt due to health problems or other serious reasons, or if the hunt needs to be terminated early due to illness or injury, the total value of the hunt is covered by the insurance.

WAIVER OF LIABILITY DECLARATION

Every client needs to sign a waiver of liability declaration to confirm being aware of the risks and dangers involved in Big Game hunting and a stay in the wilderness. We can provide you with a preview of the form.

TROPHY TRANSPORT

The trophies must be delivered to a Canadian taxidermist at the customer's own expense, until the American CITES Import Permit is obtained. We are happy to recommend you a Canadian taxidermist, who is acquainted with the Canadian and American import regulations.

MARINE MAMMAL PROTECTION ACT: Please respect the current import regulations for your country of residence. The Walrus is listed under CITES in appendix III and demands an export permit for Canada as well as an import permit for the respective country in Europe.

RECOMMENDED EQUIPMENT

Caribou skin suits are available in Resolute for all clients to use. These consist of parka, pants, boots and mitts. But you must have your own down filled clothing and boots for the flight from Ottawa to Iqaluit to Resolute but also for walking around the village. The down filled parka is quicker to put on than a caribou skin parka if you have to go outside the sleeping accommodation quickly.

All Arctic hunters should bring a pair of sunglasses. Snow blindness is a possibility without eye protection. If the hunter wears prescription glasses or contact lenses, he should bring a spare pair as well. All hunters should bring a supply of aspirins, tablets for indigestion, constipation and diarrhea. Hunters should also bring any necessary prescription medicines along with them.

All of the hunting clothing and gear should be packed in sturdy duffel bags.

Outer wear

Arctic rated down parka and down wind pants

1× Pair of Arctic rated warm mittens

1× Pair of warm thin liner gloves which you can use to shoot

Warm hat with flaps for ears

Balaclava or ski mask for the face

Ski goggles for protecting eyes while traveling on snowmobile

1× Pair of Sorel-type boots with rubber bottoms and leather tops, insulated with double felt or wool pile liners or a nylon air cushion between the sole of the liners and the inside bottom of the boot

1× Pair of Boot Blankets or synthetic over boots

Camp clothes

Jogging suit or similar to sleep in (accommodation can be in tents or the cabin on the sled).

The sleeping accommodation will be heated

Wool "watch cap" or toque for the head for sleeping

1× Set of long, two-piece Merino wool underwear

2× Pairs of warm Marino wool socks

1× Pair of woolen pants or equivalent

2× Heavy woolen shirts or equivalent

Heavy sweater or light down jacket

Sleeping bag

Down bag (to save weight) and calibrated to extreme low of -40°C

Equipment

1× Binoculars

1× Ski or snowmobile goggles

1× Sharp knife

1× Soft-padded gun case for carrying rifle on sled during hunt.
