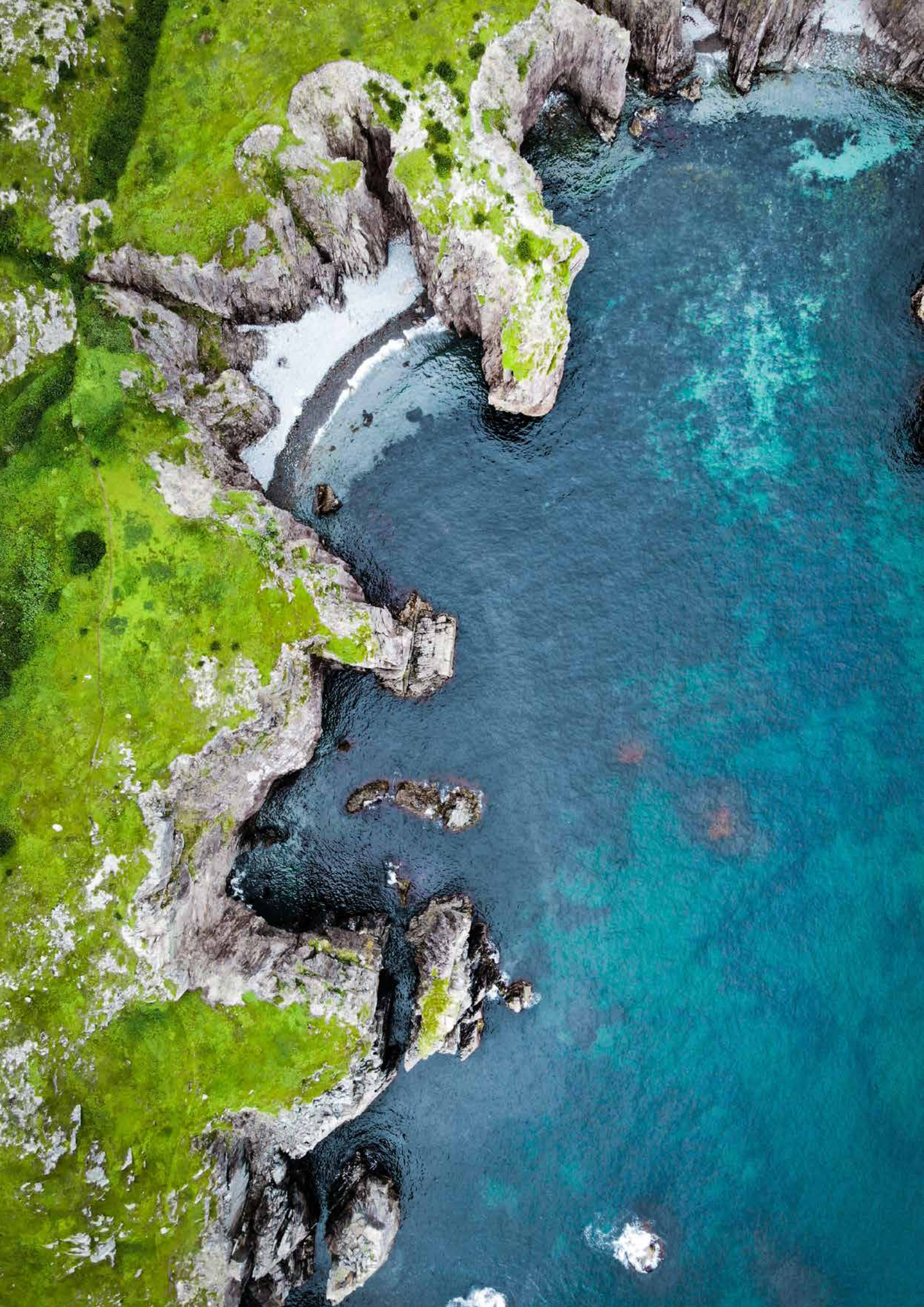

## CURRENCY

1 Canadian dollar (CAD) = 100 cents



## TIME DIFFERENCE

### Multiple time zones

The difference ranges from  
Newfoundland, Newfoundland Standard Time (NST) CET –9h (West Coast) to CET –5h (East Coast)  
Atlantic Standard Time (AST) CET –4.5h (St. John)  
Eastern Standard Time (EST) CET –5h (Halifax)  
Central Standard Time (CST) CET –6h (Toronto, Montreal)  
Mountain Standard Time (MST) CET –7h (Winnipeg, Regina)  
Pacific Standard Time (PST) CET –8h (Edmonton, Calgary)  
CET –9h (Vancouver)

Canadian Summer Time (standard time plus one hour) applies from the second Sunday in March to the first Sunday in November. Saskatchewan (Regina) is the only province in Canada that does not have daylight saving time.



## CLIMATE

There are large differences because of the size of the country. There is a humid Pacific climate on the west coast, a dry continental climate in the Prairie Provinces and an Atlantic climate influenced by the Gulf Stream in the east. The temperate climate zone is relatively narrow, and the arctic climate extends into the inhabited areas. Average temperatures range from -20°C to +25°C, while extreme temperatures range from -40°C to +40°C. In the cold season, you need appropriate equipment.

## HEALTH

### Vaccinations

Please note the vaccination requirements for each country. This information is provided by the relevant institute of tropical medicine. If vaccinations are required, please note that you are personally responsible for complying with the rules. No vaccinations are required on entry, except when entering via an infected area (smallpox).

You are strongly advised to take out travel insurance for illness and ambulance services (there are extremely high hospital costs as well as long waiting periods for treatment in Canada).



# HUNT IN NEWFOUNDLAND



**AIR TRAVEL:**  
Newfoundland is the most easterly point in North America and is the closest to Europe.

When flying to Newfoundland you will fly from your nearest airport to Canada (generally via Toronto, Halifax or St. John's) and finally into Gander International Airport. Upon arrival in Gander you take a taxi and drive to the

hotel in Gander. Next day our partner pick you up at the hotel and transfer to Victoria Lodge (2 hours on blacktop pavement and 1 hour on gravel road). It may be possible to arrange Saturday pick-up, but this is dependent upon cabin availability. You start hunting on Monday –Friday and transfer back to Gander on Saturday for your return flight. (no hunting on Sunday)

**WOUNDED GAME:** Wounded game is considered a finished hunt

# ACCOMMODATION



## THE LODGE

The Lodge is located about 40 miles south of Miller-town in Central Newfoundland. The site overlooks the Victoria River, near key gathering sites and migration routers for all types of big game and has attracted the interest of hunters and anglers alike. The Lodge is located on one of the best areas for Black Bear and other big game hunting anywhere in the Province of Newfoundland and Labrador – a Province that boasts some of the largest black bear in North America and some of the highest moose densities in the world.

Our site consists of a main lodge with telephone services and four modern cabins. The Lodge contains a very spacious and cheerful dining and lounge area overlooking the Victoria River, as well as a full kitchen and two fully equipped bathrooms (one fully wheel chair accessible bathroom). The three adjacent cabins are designed to accommodate up to three people each, and a fourth cabin is available which has a room divider for privacy and can accommodate up to four people, perfect for a small family.



PACKAGES

SPRING BLACK BEAR HUNT (26 MAY – 15 JUNE)



Black Bears are native to Newfoundland and are among the Largest Black Bears in North America with spring weights exceeding 500 lbs: one of the largest weighed in at 676 lbs and would put this bear close to 800 lbs in the fall.

Our partner is located in prime areas for some of the largest Black Bears in North America (potential trophy size). The average weight of the Black Bears are from 200 lbs to 350 lbs with always the chance of taking one over 500 lbs. Skull size to date have ranged from 16 inch to over 21 inch with the largest length being 78 inch from nose to tail.

FALL MOOSE HUNT (15 SEP – 02 NOV)



Moose are not native to Newfoundland but they introduced in 1904 and from there the numbers have grown tremendously. This area is one of the larges moose populations per square mile and has a high re-population rate.

The moose shed their antlers during the winter and they begin to grow again in the early spring until late August when they have reached their full potential. The bull moose breeding season or “rut” begins towards late September and continues until mid October.

# RECOMMENDED EQUIPMENT

Below are some examples of personal things you may wish to bring for your hunt in Newfoundland. Please be aware that the climate can be cold and/or wet during hunting season, so we advise you to check the weather in the week before arrival and prepare accordingly.

Chap Stick
Blister Kit

### PLEASE NOTE:

- \* Rifle should be 270 caliber or larger and bow should be at least 50lb draw weight.
- \*\* We recommend that you sight your rifle for 200 yards and know where your bullet is hitting at 100 and 300 yards.
